COM1205 – Photography – Introduction Outline

The word photography comes from two Greek words, photo – meaning light, and graphy – meaning draw. Photography is the art and science of using rays of light to form an image on a light sensitive material.

In this course, you will learn the basics of photography – how to draw with light, using a camera. You will become familiar with the proper ways to use the functions of your camera. Using your knowledge of how images are created, you will also begin to predict what the finished result will be.

You will start to use standard photographic methods and you will practice your new skills as you work through the course. You will also learn to critique images. When you use a camera, you will be able to apply what you learn in this course and take great pictures. Remember, the teacher is always there to guide you if needed.

Level: Introductory

Prerequisite: COM1005: Visual Composition

Description: Students develop essential skills in camera use with a focus on basic composition, set-up and examination of exposure. Students operate a camera to capture images and produce final display proofs.

Parameters: Access to a camera with the ability to control aperture and shutter speed independently, and to processing and display equipment.

Course Structure

COM1205 – Photography is arranged into 3 sections: Introductory assignments, projects, and a portfolio. The Introductory assignment will allow you to familiarize yourself with basic camera functions and features. Each of the 6 project will focus on taking photos that fit a certain theme. The best images that you take for your assignments will be used to create a portfolio of your work. These should be your best photos that you have taken throughout the module.

In order to be successful in this course, read all of the materials presented and be sure to complete all of the assignments. Before attempting the assignments ensure that you understand the written material and the assignment requirements.
